Maundy Thursday Tenebrae Service April 18, 7:00 p.m. — St. Mark's Sanctuary



Matthew 25 is located on Kenwood Rd., Cincinnati. It is a nonprofit, international humanitarian aid and disaster relief organization. More than 99% of cash and in-kind donations go toward programs. The people they help are given a helping hand, positioning them to become self-reliant.

MISSION MOMENT

Good Neighbor Sunday will be on **May 5** this year: a time of worship, service and fellowship ending with lunch and sharing of experiences. Church will begin at 9:30 as usual, community service will follow an abbreviated worship and lunch will be served in the Fellowship Hall at 12:00. Many of the outreach and service opportunities we experienced last year will be available as well as new opportunities. The sign up sheets will be located in the Welcome Area during the month of April. Last year the feedback was overwhelmingly positive, and we can't wait to see how God leads us this year.

Fall Mission Trip – September 19 – 22: This fall we will be going on a mission trip to the **Appalachian Service Project in Jonesville, VA**, about a 4 ½ hour drive. We will leave from church Thursday morning, Sept. 19. That evening we will form work groups and be assigned a family and a project. We will get to know the families while working on Friday and Saturday and return to the center each day for an evening of fellowship, reflection, sharing, singing, playing and free time. We will leave for home Sunday morning. The cost is \$130 per person. No experience is needed to participate in this mission trip.

There will be a meeting after church on April 28 in the Heritage Room for all who are interested.

Also, don't forget there are opportunities to volunteer at **Shared Harvest** on April 25 from 1 – 3p and with the **Broken Bus** to prepare food for April 27.

Let's Talk, and Listen An Invitation from Administrative Council

As many of you already know, the decision was made at the Special Session of General Conference to keep our current statements about homosexuality, same-sex marriage and the ordination of LGBTQIA persons the same, with stricter enforcements to those who do not comply. This decision passed by a narrow margin of 54 votes. A disaffiliation plan was also passed providing guidelines for congregations who wish to leave the UMC for "reasons of conscience." These decisions are under review by the UMC Judicial Council which meets in late April.

The Administrative Council believes that these recent denomination give our congregation a perfect opportunity to practice "Healthy and Open Communication" (one of our Core Values) by beginning a conversation regarding these decisions. Late last year approval was given by Administrative Council to distribute a survey (seen on next page) to our church family. The hope is that the results of this survey will enable us to have a starting point for this conversation.

We respectfully ask that each member or regular attendee of St. Mark's Church, age 13 and older, complete this survey. Taking the time to complete this survey and turning it in will enable your voice to be heard, privately and discreetly (you are welcome to add your name if you desire). Additional copies of the survey will be available in the welcome center as needed. A wooden box marked "Survey Forms" will be at the Welcome Center in the narthex. Please place your completed survey in that box by April 21.

The Results of the survey will be shared at a later date. Thank you for letting your voice be heard, and for being a faithful part of the St. Mark's family.

There may be some who are wondering why "now" with this survey, especially around the season of Lent and Easter. Some may believe that what happens at the denominational level does not concern us. A thought may be that, regardless of the decisions made at the General Conference level, here at SMUMC all are welcome to attend our church and worship with us.

To some extent, I can empathize. I'm not excited about talking about this either, which is perhaps the main reason why my feet have been so dusty (see above)! I have hesitated because I know what St. Mark's has gone through during this past year. We have spent these last months seeking to become a healthy congregation. So yes, although I've hinted about it a time or to, I have been reluctant to broach this subject with the congregation as a whole.

However, I believe we must begin this conversation. The reason why we need to talk about this is because we know in our hearts that this conversation is not about a "subject," or an "issue." It matters to us here at St. Mark's. What is being decided at the denominational level concerns "our own." They are our own beloved church members, and members of our own families, our children, grandchildren, and grandchildren. The question at hand is not whether we "welcome" all people. We do that, at least theoretically. We want to make sure that our "welcome" is genuine, and real. No ifs, ands, or buts. This goes to our understanding of Scripture (yes, Scripture remains primary), and much more.

So, yes, let's have the conversation. After all, this does tie in with our Core Values of Intentional Faith Development, Healthy & Open Communication, and Risk-taking Service, Mission, and Nurture, right?

3-4 Pity: LGBT people are somehow born that way and it is pitiful.

5-6 Tolerance: Life for LGBT people is hard; anti-gay attitudes just make things worse.

7-8 Acceptance: Homosexuality is a fact of life that should neither be punished nor celebrated.

9-10 Support: The rights of LGBT people should be protected and safeguarded.

11-12 Admiration: Being LGBT in our society takes strength.

13-14 Appreciation: There is value in diversity. Homophobic attitudes should be confronted.

15-16 Nurturance: LGBT people are an indispensable part of society.
