A Note from Pastor Joe

Dear St. Mark's Family,

This letter comes from my heart to yours.

The long-awaited results of the "Attitudes Toward Difference" surveys are finally revealed in this newsletter. I don't think anyone will be surprised by what the survey results reveal. The purpose of this survey was not to provide answers or direction; it was to serve as a conversation starter about human sexuality. Your Administrative Council believed it to be a good idea to have this conversation. I agreed with them.

Well, it worked. We are talking!

These past few weeks, I have engaged in some deep and thoughtful conversations with members of the church family, folks who come to this subject from all different angles. I deeply admire and respect all who have shared with me, and I am so grateful to hear from them. Some have spoken with hope and optimism. Others have spoken with a sense of weariness. Some are saying that it's about time and we need to speed things up. Others are just tired.

I wondered why some seemed so worn out (for lack of a better term), so I listened. They shared their concern about the amount of time devoted to this one matter. I agreed with them. There are so many needs. They shared their irritation about the specially called General Conversation that seemed to bring this on. This was beyond our control; if nothing else, it shows that this is a matter of global concern. It's also our church family's concern. They also shared feelings of being coerced into agreeing with something that goes against their will.

I was surprised to hear this last concern, but I appreciate their honesty. It helped to explain their sense of weariness. Kelley Bryson, author of *Don't Be Nice, Be Real: Balancing Passion for Self with Compassion for Others,* writes, "It is the very use of coercion, positive or negative, that breaks or deadens the spirit, which is the source of motivation." The Indonesian author, Toba Beta simply stated it this way: "Coercing attitude drains your strength."

I get it. Coercion *can* be draining. I don't believe in "twisting arms," or in wearing someone down by talking about something over and over again. It is counter-productive. It is also impossible to pull off successfully. I'm reminded of the exasperated mother speaking to her whining kids: "We are going to [fill in the blank here], and we are all going to have a good time!" R

going to [fill in the blank here], and we are all going to have a good time!" <u>Riiiiiight</u>. It doesn't work that way! People have to be inwardly convinced, deep in their bones, on their own terms and in their own time.

All the same, we can't just stop the conversation altogether. We can't silence those with differing views simply because they do not align with our own, can we? We have to be able to share from our hearts. People should not ever seek to coerce, but people should be able to share.

It isn't easy to hear views that go against our own beliefs. Sometimes, it's downright painful. But, we know that we can listen for understanding, if not actual agreement. Listening keeps our minds fresh. It allows our minds to be open to confirm our present beliefs, or to consider something we haven't considered before.

I like the quote from John Wesley at the top of this letter. The longer quote is this:

"Though we cannot think alike, may we not love alike? May we not be of one heart, though we are not of one opinion? Without all doubt, we may. Herein all the children of God may unite, notwithstanding these smaller differences."

I have this hope that our congregation can love one another, and be united in ministry with and for others, even when we do not agree on everything.

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I suppose some may be concerned about the possibility that their minds might be changed after all. Some believe that changing one's mind is a sign of weakness. I believe the opposite is true. It is one of the hardest things we will ever do. Changing one's mind may require going against how we were raised by our parents, or taught in Sunday School long ago. Seriously considering compelling testimony that counters deeply imbedded beliefs can cause real headaches! Changing one's mind is not a sign of weakness. It is a sign of strength. It just can't be coerced.

In the last 20-plus years, I have changed. I never would have dreamed that I would arrive at the beliefs I now hold. Years of study, of considering the context of the scriptures, and of getting to know people more fully have brought me to this place.

I have decided that if a family member, a member of our church family, or community citizen comes to me with a request that I officiate their marriage, my decision will be based on my discernment of their fitness for marriage, and not because of their sexuality. I have also decided to offer my full support to persons who desire ordination and are being denied their vocation simply because of their sexuality.

The Apostle Paul states that a sign of a disciple is one who bears good fruit. I have gotten to know many lgbtq+ persons who bear good fruit. The Rev. David Meredith is one such person. He is a pastor who is also a gay person and who has been with the same partner – now spouse – for over twenty years. David was the officiant at our son's memorial service. He ministered to my family with love and grace, and led an eloquent service. He was our pastor during our time of need. This is what I mean when I say this is personal. Because I know David and other lgbtq+ persons with similar gifts and graces, I no longer understand being gay as being incompatible with Christian teaching. The few Bible verses that have traditionally condemned such behavior do not describe persons such as David, in my opinion. I have known David for over ten years. He has been my clergy cluster leader since my appointment to the Ohio River Valley District. I do not believe David is a false prophet in sheep's clothing. David is a "good tree that does not bear bad fruit." (Matthew 7:18)



In fact, knowing what I know now, it would be sinful of me to turn against David and declare that his ordination was not valid. Likewise, it would be hypocritical of me to deny his marriage to his life partner, who he has been faithful to for over 20 years.

I share this testimony with the hope that you will receive it, even if you can't agree with it. I share not to coerce, but to let you know where I am, and with the hope that we can continue to minister and serve together.

Again, I'm going to step back from speaking publicly about it. I don't want to force this belief on you, but I thought you needed to know. Feel free to speak with me about this or anything else. I want to hear what you have to say. Ultimately, this conversation needs to be led by you, our laity.

For now, I am looking forward to being a part of the mission team being sent to southwest Virginia this September. One week after that mission trip, I look forward to gathering in the sanctuary with you for a brief time of worship, and then doing any number of projects together to do kind things for our neighbors around us. I look forward to giving of my finances and time with you, working together, side by side, to be Christ's hands and feet. We live in a broken world, in need Christ. I am thankful to be a part of a congregation who believes so strongly in mission, in extending the love and grace of Christ to others.

ST. MARK'S CARES MISSION MOMENT

We hope you are having a fun, relaxing and renewing summer! Yes, many of us have been busy traveling and enjoying summer sports and pool time, but we didn't slow down in our service to others! A group of 17 volunteered at Matthew 25 Ministries, served a meal at Serve City and offered a meal and love to the homeless via the Broken Bus. In June we collected over \$600 worth of games, Lego and craft kits, markers and sporting supplies for the Butler County Big Brothers Big Sisters after school programs. Currently, we are collecting school supplies that will be given to students in the Fairfield schools via Dougie and Ray's mission. In August, we will be collecting monetary donations for UMCOR disaster relief, particularly for our Dayton neighbors who are recovering from recent tornado damage. In addition to all of that, the St. Mark's Cares committee, along with fourteen amazing youth and adult volunteers, spent 4 afternoons at Living Water Ministries sharing the VBS program "Polar Blast."

We will be collecting monetary donations for UMCOR during the month of August. Contributions can be made through the offering plate. Please specify "UMCOR" in the memo line of your check or on your offering envelope. All donations will be sent to our West Ohio Conference to help those in our area, including our Dayton friends who recently experienced devasting tornado damage.

ASP brings thousands of volunteers from around the country to rural Central Appalachia to help make homes warmer, safer and drier for low-income families. MISSION SPOTLIGHT

Serve City

622 East Avenue, Hamilton

I am grateful to have found a way to help Serve City through St. Mark's Cares. Tom and I have donated clothes and food items since we met fifteen years ago. He researched area missions and found their low overhead and help for families in need in our area appealing.

We saw the mission at work personally through my nephew John. John was one of God's lost children who turned to drugs at an early age. My family had tried to help John through rehab many times over the years. Serve City provided food and clothing for him through the pantry at various intervals. Three years ago, in his early forties, John was homeless and supposedly working on abstinence. He was accepted into the shelter for counseling and assistance, but he died of an accidental Fentanyl overdose before he got to spend a night in the shelter.

Addiction is a very real disease that affects not only the addicted person, but it affects their spouses, their children, their parents, their siblings, their aunts and uncles, their grandparents, and their friends.

SERVE CITY, a ministry of area churches, is a place where low-income and homeless individuals and families can receive groceries, clothing, personal care items and Christian materials and support.

- * THE LORD'S CUPBOARD food pantry serves nearly 1,000 persons each month.
- * CHOSEN is their 52-bed emergency shelter, providing and meals.

- * SHEKINAH PLACE, provides permanent single tenant housing that is affordable and drug and alcohol free, helping those who are recovering from addiction.
- * CHOICES provides transitional housing for homeless residents working to get back on their feet and permanent housing for those who do not qualify for existing services but in need of a supporting housing environment.

In 2018, almost 21,000 individuals were served a meal at Serve City. Fourteen thousand nights of shelter were provided to 450 individuals. Serve City estimates a cost of \$13 a day to provide food, clothing, shelter, case management services and referrals.

St. Mark's supports Serve City with regular monetary donations and by making and serving a meal to the residents, usually every other month. Watch the bulletin, newsletter and bulletin board for opportunities to help with these meals. There are other ways to get involved as well. The pantry is open for volunteers Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday from 10-12:00 pm. Donation drop off is Monday – Saturday from 10-3:00 pm. They accept gently used clothing items, in-date food items and personal care items. Their most needed items currently are laundry detergent, socks, toilet paper and deodorant.

If you are interested in preparing a lunch for the residents at the shelter, please call 737-8900 to schedule a time. St. Mark's Cares will continue to offer opportunities to serve dinners.

St. Mark's Financial Update

Greeting St. Mark's Family,

There are many exciting things happening in ministry at St. Mark's that are fueled by the giving of the church. Your giving supports these faith-based initiatives and make a difference in people's lives.

Our recent report to the district highlighted many of these including:

- *Mission outreach to Shared Harvest, the Broken Bus, Serve City and Matthew 25 all great examples of spreading God's love outside the four walls of St. Mark's
- *Donation drives from the Heifer project, Big Brothers Big Sisters, Dougie and Ray's, and UMCOR
- *Two Vacation Bible Schools one for Living Waters and another for St. Mark's where we taught over 100 children about Christ
- *Bringing four new confirmands into the membership of the church
- *The welcoming of several new members into St. Mark's
- *A resurgence in our Youth Group under new leadership

All of this is made possible through the giving of your time and money.

In June we received just over \$29,000 for the five-week month. Our June expenses were just over \$30,000. The good news is despite June being a lackluster month, we remain about \$23,000 ahead of last year's giving. We have spent \$20,000 less than we budgeted for the year. In addition, we continue to pay our monthly apportionments, and our loans of just under \$75,000 remain current.

The not-so-good news is we continue to borrow from ourselves to fund our church ministry, cleaning, and utilities. This so-called borrowing was \$5,500 in June (up from \$4,000 at the end of April). This is not a good trend.

So, if giving is ahead of last year and our expenses are down, why are we borrowing from ourselves? Great Question! We should remember:

- * Last year, our giving was down dramatically in May & June due to the turmoil we were experiencing. While this year's giving is up from last year, it's about even with 2017. So, we've returned giving to about its historical level.
- * Last year, we went several months without key staff, meaning we weren't paying a pastor or a discipleship director. Since about March of this year, we've been fully staffed and had extra salary expense.
- * In addition, we've put a fair amount of money to bring the parsonage up to a better standard. We've replaced the appliances, repaired the floors and done a lot of painting for about \$7,500. In the long run, using the parsonage for the Pastor's home will be a cost savings for us as we should get our \$2,000 per year property tax bill exempted and save the housing allowance we provide the pastor. But in the short run, it's a drain on our cash position.
