The summer is flying by! I understand that some of you have a difficult time with the summer heat and humidity. I, on the other hand, practically live for these summer months. Unless I am busy in front of the computer, you will often find me tending the garden or doing something else outside.

Speaking of the garden, it is growing! In addition to the "Payne Plot," St. Mark's folks have planted beans, corn,

pumpkins, gourds, sunflowers, marigolds, and melampodium flowers. My thanks to Gay and Marty Kubik, Gunnar Marshall, Alethea LaMar, and Pam and David Brockfield for getting it all planted. The seeds were planted June 15 and are now up and growing rapidly, thanks to David's continual watering. That is making a big difference. Thank you, team!

The vision for this garden is to provide fresh garden produce for our food pantries. Linda and I have already donated 13 bags of leaf lettuce to the Fairfield Food Pantry, as well as 5 large bags of kale and 5 equally large bags of collard greens to the Pantry in Springdale. The clients are delighted to receive fresh veggies. Plus, if our harvest is especially successful, we may even share some with you. Let's hope!

Another vision for the garden is to open it up for others in the church to participate, and perhaps to open it up even wider to the greater community. Inspiration for our garden comes from a church garden I saw in Upper Arlington, in the greater Columbus area. They call it a Community Garden, except it isn't divided into individual family garden plots. What makes it a "community garden" is that people from the surrounding community are invited to help tend it. I hope to learn more about "how their garden grows," so we can learn from them.

In the mean time, it is fun (at least for me!) to be outside in the fresh air and in the soil. Sure, we could "go to Kroger," but for me, gardening helps me to connect with God's creation. The fresh veggies taste good, too! Even if you don't help tend our garden, I hope it at least brings a smile to your face.

FAQs about Room at the Table:

Q: How were the committee members selected?

A: These members were not "selected." The committee came about from a group of church members who are passionate about becoming a Reconciling Ministry church. This group began to meet informally and eventually requested the Admin Board to make them an official committee of St. Mark's.

Q: Does the administrative council get to make the decision about whether we will become a Reconciling Ministry Church?

A: No, the decision to become a Reconciling Ministry Church will be decided upon by a vote of the members of the church. The role of the Admin Board will be to conduct the vote.

Q: When will the vote be?

A: There has not been a date sent for a vote. The committee strongly believes that we need to spend a meaningful amount of time in graceful discussion about the topic over the next few months and perhaps as long as year.

Q: Does becoming a Reconciling Ministry mean we will not be a part of the United Methodist Church anymore?

A: Absolutely not. There are United Methodist churches in our conference that are Reconciling Ministry Churches and remain part of the connectional system that makes up the United Methodist Church.

Q: What does it really mean to become a Reconciling Ministry Church?

A: Becoming a Reconciling Ministry Church means that St. Mark's disagrees with the harmful language in the Book of Discipline that condemns homosexuality. It means that we do not believe that homosexuality is a sin, that we support gay marriage and that we support members of the LBGTQI+ community to become ordained in the United Methodist Church.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE REPORT FOR THE CONGREGATION

Sue Luken, Lay Member to Annual Conference

The 52nd Session of the West Ohio Annual Conference was a virtual gathering of nearly 1,800 clergy and lay members. Bishop Gregory V. Palmer presided over the conference under the theme, Perseverance, rooted in the scripture, Hebrews 12:1-2.

"Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith..."

During the Episcopal Address, Bishop Palmer spoke to the weariness facing church leaders and congregations. "There is no shame in naming weariness," he said. He reminded conference members of the stories throughout the bible of people who persevered.

"Their stories remind us that we are not the first to walk this journey, to toil and to struggle to be who God called us to be," he said. "Jesus' way does call for us to inconvenience our preferences and our egos for the larger vision of beloved community, of just relationships; it calls for us to release some of what we have so others may just have something. It causes us to be our very best selves and we must persist. We have been called to be those who persevere even in the midst of obstacle and inconvenience," he said.

In keeping with the theme of perseverance, Bishop shifted his context to Hebrews 12: 3-4-and invited the membership to ask themselves these three missional questions: "Who do you see around you on this journey? What are we willing to get rid in order to really be the Church and, to what lengths are you willing to go for the sake of the mission of Jesus Christ in the world?"

Legislation

Recommendation #1 - 2022 Budget PASSED (as is with editorial correction: Book of Reports page 41, lines 22 and 24—change 2020 to 2021)

The 2022 budget was adopted as presented. Conference is well positioned financially to continue training leaders and equipping local churches to transform people and communities. Financial resources continue to be in place to fulfill our promises to retirees. The Board of Pensions requested no apportionment support for 2022. The amount apportioned in 2022 reflects a 3.3% reduction over 2021 apportionments. Since 2018, it is lower by 21%. The 2022 budget will replace eight separate district apportioned funds with a single aggregate district fund.

Recommendation #2 - Commission on Equitable Compensation PASSED

The 2022 Equitable Compensation recommendation was adopted as presented. Minimum salaries increase 2% for each credential. The committee sought to balance the needs of appointed clergy and the financial challenges of the local church.

Recommendation #3 - Board of Pensions PASSED

Eligibility for retiree and health care plans did not change. The recommendation reported the board's

plan to implement a Health Reimbursement Account approach for retiree healthcare, replacing the employer sponsored group plan. This is in partnership with VIA Benefits and Wespath.

Pre-1982 pension plan years of service will increase to \$623 per month, an increase from \$611 over 2021.

Recommendation #4 – Christmas Covenant – REFERRED to West Ohio Conference General and Jurisdictional Conference delegations

The West Ohio Conference referred the recommendation back to the delegation for further study and review alongside the Protocol. The Christmas Covenant legislation would establish regions across the denomination, including the United States. It was authored and advanced by delegates in Central Conferences. The West Ohio general and jurisdictional delegations supported the legislation. The resolution asked the West Ohio Conference to fully support the Christmas Covenant, the leadership of Central Conference delegates and encouraged West Ohio General Conference delegates to support the Christmas Covenant and send a letter to the General Conference Secretary in support of the legislation.

Recommendation #5 - Loved as the Image of God - PASSED

West Ohio Annual Conference desires to be aligned with a United Methodist Church witness that is inclusive of all people and is theologically diverse.

Recommendation #6 – Call to West Ohio Annual Conference to recognize and validate persons' calls to ordination without prejudice toward sexual orientation or gender Identity - TABLED

The recommendation asked that the Board of Ordained Ministry consider requests for ordination and conference membership without prejudice toward a candidate's sexual ordination or gender identity.

Other business

- Commissioned two provisional deacons and seven provisional elders
- Ordained one deacon and nine elders
- Honored retirees including 30 elders, two deacons, one associate member and seven local pastors
- Commissioned three Deaconesses
- Authorized the Annual Conference Planning Committee to determine the location of the 2023 annual conference session based on current and emerging realities
- Bishop Palmer advised the body of his short-term assignment to the Illinois Great Rivers Conference (IGRC) as to provide episcopal oversight for the IGRC July 1-December 31, while Bishop Beard is on medical leave. He encouraged the conference to widen the circle of prayer for Bishop Frank and Mrs. Melissa Beard and the people of the IGRC.

The 2022 West Ohio Annual Conference will be held June 2 – 5 at Lakeside Chautauqua.

St. Mark's Financial Update

Hello St. Mark's Family,

As we come up on the halfway point of the year, we thought we'd change up this month's article.

While the finances of the church are not in bad shape, we've seen a decline in giving over the past few months. Our weekly average for this year is about \$5,850 compared to \$6,600 last year. A drop of \$750 per week is meaningful!

We did budget for a decline in giving as we expected to receive \$6,300 per week but the much bigger drop has put a strain on the amount of money we have on deposit.

The chart below shows the average weekly giving shows the past ten years of giving.



The good news is that we have many first-time givers as new folks have started coming to church and joined St. Mark's. Also, almost 40% of givers have increased their gifts. We are certainly thankful for this generosity.

To help offset the decline in total giving, we've kept our expenses within our means. This year, we have spent only \$1,100 more than we did last

year. And considering that the church building was closed for several months at this time last year, that's a good result. We've also spent \$5,000 less than our budget due to lower than budgeted salary and benefits costs.

In terms of designated giving, we have collected \$12,100 for designated accounts. This is up about \$700 from last year. While designated giving serves a valuable purpose, we hope that it is additional giving and does not relate to a reduction in general giving. As I joke, we don't have a designated account called "staff salary" or "utilities". One of the main purposes of the Finance Committee is to find creative ways to turn their congregations into tithing congregations with attitudes of generosity as well as to develop stewardship campaigns to raise enough funds to meet the budget of the church. As we move forward, the finance committee is beginning to explore these opportunities.
