Dear St. Mark's family,

As you know, the CDC is once again recommending that all persons – vaccinated or not – return to wearing masks when indoors in public settings. It took me a while to understand why we should continue to mask even after being fully vaccinated. Call me a slow learner.

To be real with you, it's frustrating and irritating! Masks are a nuisance! You may feel the same way as I do. And, it took me a while to understand. Everything I had read and heard states that those who are vaccinated and healthy need not fear. Even if the vaccinated get the virus, the symptoms are few or non-existent. I'm vaccinated. I'm healthy. Why should I mask?

I was so frustrated I emailed Jennifer Bailer, our Butler County Health Commissioner. I knew it would do little good, but I needed to vent. "Why, Ms. Bailer, do I and others need to mask. We are fully vaccinated. We are safe, right?" Ms. Bailer replied graciously:

"I have heard that sentiment too, and I understand. I wish we were in control of the pandemic. But, the truth is the virus is in charge and we are running as fast as we can after it :("

Right now, this new and aggressive variant is raging around the globe, with increasing numbers of cases, which has forced the health community to rethink their protocols. Those at high risk are unvaccinated. The unvaccinated include those who cannot receive the vaccine for health reasons and our kids younger than twelve years of age. Others at risk are those persons who are fully vaccinated but are also immunocompromised. Currently, the vast majority those hospitalized for Covid-19 are unvaccinated persons.

It's true that even healthy vaccinated individuals may on rare occasions contract the virus, but we also know that the vast majority of these cases exhibit mild or non-existent symptoms. That's good news! However, this means that it's possible for a vaccinated person to have the virus and not even know it. And this means that vaccinated persons like myself could spread the virus to children, to unvaccinated adults, or to vaccinated adults with weakened immunity. I don't want to do that.

So, in order to protect and care for the most vulnerable, I will be wearing a mask to worship and to other indoor public places. Yea, masks are a pain. They can be hot and uncomfortable. They can fog my glasses! But, I suppose the inconveniences are minor if it means helping to keep others safe.

I'm not mandating masks. However, if you plan to worship in-person with us, I strongly suggest/encourage you to continue masking up if you can. Bottom line, I know we all want to protect our kids and the most vulnerable among us. I'm thankful for all of the ways you show your love for others.

ST. Mark's Financial Update

Hello St. Mark's Family,

July was a typical financial month for the church. Total giving was about \$26,000 – the same as in June. Year-to-date we have received \$181,000. We continue to handle all our expenses and keep them in check. We have faithfully made our apportionments each month and have reduced our loan balance to under \$50,000!

I've heard some comments that our giving is down because of people who've left St. Mark's. So, we did some research and actually found that the opposite is true! For 2021, we have seen the following:

Declines in giving due to deceased members:	-\$2,500
Declines in giving due to members leaving:	-\$3,100
Increases in giving due to new members/attendees:	\$5,800
Net Change from new and departing members:	\$200

That's positive news for the church on the giving front. Unfortunately, we will always have people leaving the church for various reasons but when new givers more than make up for the loss it's a good financial thing for the church. Thank you to all who continue to support St. Mark's financially and those who have been able to increase their giving this year, as well as giving from our new members!

Recently, the Finance Committee and the Administrative Board decided to investigate the start of a legacy endowment fund. The endowment would be funded through a member's designating St. Mark's to receive a contribution from their will. Many members have spent a meaningful part of their life supporting St. Mark's through their generous contributions and a well-established legacy endowment fund can be a way for our members to ensure St. Mark's remains a vital part of people's faith-based lives long into the future. The purpose of the endowment fund is still to be determined, but most often they are designated for building maintenance and capital improvements. It will not be created to be used for normal operations of the church. Endowment should not replace the congregation's annual giving but should expand giving. There's a lot of work to do on this to decide if St. Mark's wants a legacy endowment fund and more work to set one up. If you have thoughts on this, please share them with us.


to the chancel choir and/or bell choir. SO with that in mind I'm proposing a rehearsal/singing plan for the early fall that will hopefully accomplish just that!

A detail that still needs to be worked out is...sing in the choir loft every other chair...come up from congregation to the steps, sing, and return to seats (like we do for Christmas Eve), or seated in the choir loft as we've always done. The ongoing COVID issues will have an effect on this decision. Again everyone being comfortable is important!

I want to continue this process of rehearse/sing on Sunday mornings for September 12, 19, 26, October 3, and 10. Choir rehearsals would resume on Wednesday October 13 from 7:30-9. At that time we can assess where we are with COVID restrictions and how it is effecting our arrangement for rehearsing and Sunday morning singing. If all is going well my plan would be to begin a Christmas cantata that would be presented mid-December, along with our weekly anthem selections.

The choir is missed and getting you all back together will be a huge blessing to everyone...BUT...I want us to come together with small steps first, then building onto that foundation as the fall progresses. Anyone who would like to join the choir, this would be a great time because we will only be focusing on one song at a time for several weeks. This is a chance for everyone, returning or new, to get those voices back into shape again!

ROOM AT THE TABLE

We are so thankful to all who have attended our "Desserts and Discussions!" Sixty people total attended the evening offerings and fourteen came to our daytime events. Both sessions included the viewing of "Through Our Eyes," a documentary that follows the coming-out story of several young adults to their friends, their families, and their churches. The other film, "An Act of Love," detailed the story of Rev. Frank Schaeffer, a UMC pastor who was stripped of his ordination credentials after performing the same-sex marriage of his son. Both films were the stimulus of great conversation around the idea of St. Mark's becoming a reconciling ministry. If you weren't able to attend and would like to see either film, please see Julie Mislansky and I will loan you the DVD.

Our team continues to have graceful, honest, one-one-one conversations with members to help us all think about the topics of whether or not we think homosexuality is a sin, same-sex marriage, the ordination of gay and lesbian persons, and the idea of St. Mark's becoming a Reconciling Church. The vast majority of our discussions have been positive and many are affirmative about this idea. If you are not sure how you feel have questions or concerns, or are against the idea, we need to hear from you. Please reach out to one of the members of our team. We are not trying to change your mind! We want to have a graceful conversation with you where everyone involved is heard and able to speak their truth. It is only through sharing our stories and our hearts that we can make this important step together as a church family. We would like to plan future educational events around your feedback.

Our team members are: Tim and Julie Mislansky, Peggy and John Smith, Charlotte Tierney, Sue Luken, Alex and Kyle Robinson, Jennie Marshall, Debbie Hill, Lois Hill, Pam Brockfield, Kathleen Lang, Bob Hamp, Julie Dichtl, Zach Dichtl, and Pastor Joe.

A reminder that our committee does not get to make this decision! Nor does the administrative board. There will be a congregational vote in the future that will determine whether or not we become a reconciling church. Again, what exactly does this mean? It means that we would be a congregation that DOES NOT agree with the wording in the UMC Book of Discipline that states that "homosexuality is not compatible with Christ's teachings." We would be saying that we DO NOT believe that homosexuality is a sin, that we affirm the validity of a same-sex marriage, and that we agree that members of the LGBT community may be ordained in the UMC church. St. Mark's would make that a public statement on our website, Facebook page, signage around the church, and in our printed materials. That would let anyone outside our church know that St. Mark's is a safe place, that ALL are welcome, and that all LGBT persons are affirmed, embraced, and encouraged to live their lives authentically in our church family.
