Dear St. Mark's Church Family,

All Saints Day is November 1. Here at St. Mark's, we will observe All Saints Sunday on November 7. As is our custom, we will be honoring all saints, living and dead, particularly those who have passed away the previous 12 months. FINANCIAL UPDATE TIM MISLANSKY, TREASURER GALE GOODMAN, FINANCE CHAIR

Greetings St. Mark's Family,

September was a really good financial month for the church. Total giving was about \$33,100 – our second best month of 2021. Year-to-date we have received \$240,600 which is down about 4% from last year.

We spent \$29,600 during the month and year-to-date, our expenses have been 234,000 -almost \$2,000 less than last year. We continue to handle all our expenses and keep them in check. We paid our 9th installment on our apportionments and are on our way to another year of 100% payment! During the month our expenses were higher than normal due to some maintenance at the church and the parsonage.

Within the next few weeks, you will receive your annual pledge card from the church. Consecration Sunday will be on November 21st. We have two asks:

- 1. Please complete a pledge card. It's just a pledge not a contract. It doesn't create a bill. But it gives the church leadership an idea of how much money we can expect during the year which helps with planning and considering new programs. Typically, we receive pledge cards from about 2/3 of our families.
- 2. Please prayerfully consider your giving to St. Mark's. Last month, we shared how St. Mark's spends your gifts for the benefit of our church, our members and our communities. Your gifts make a difference. As we go into Consecration Sunday, consider how you might share additional blessings with St. Mark's so we can expand our programs and how we make a difference.

Thank you for your generosity and cheerful giving to St. Mark's the past year and for your continued support in the future.

Thanks to all who participated in our October "Dessert and Discussion" events. We viewed and discussed a video by Karen Thompson who is the lead pastor of UpRising, a fully inclusive church in Austin, Texas. She shared very valuable and compassionate advice to guide our words and actions when a loved one comes out to us. If you missed it, want to watch if again, or want to share it with someone, here is the link.

For many of us, issues around full inclusion of LGBTQ+ persons, same-sex marriage, and ordination of LGBTQ+ persons, matter to us <u>because of someone we love</u>. Someone we love is gay, lesbian, bisexual, or transgender. That truth often changes everything for us. Our "Room at

the Table" group feels it is essential to share our stories. Our stories bring us together. We find common ground. This is where we will find guidance from the Holy Spirit. We will be sharing our stories at future events and in newsletters and encourage you to do the same. Please talk to anyone on our committee if you feel led to share your story.

Homosexuality in my family

Homosexuality has been part of my immediate family since my youngest brother Pete recognized his sexuality as a young adult. There are in my family's history hints that sexuality issues go back generations, even before the word "homosexuality" came into use in the late 19th century by an Austrian-born Hungarian psychologist, Karoly Maria Benkert.

Much of Pete's lifetime was emotionally painful. Even as a young child, he just didn't fit in. He suffered taunts years before he "came out." In time, Pete recognized his sexual orientation and found the courage to "come out." When he made this declaration, our familial reaction was not positive. This was not our finest hour. Community ostracism made Pete feel so unwelcome he moved, living in gay communities in New Orleans, Houston, and San Francisco.

Pete was 31 when he died of AIDS in 1985. he anguish of his illness made us uncomfortably aware of the intensity of his suffering. When he was approaching the end stages of this disease, dad and mother moved from their Michigan home into the unfamiliar culture of San Francisco's Castro district to care for Pete. They remained by his side, enduring their self-imposed exile until AIDS claimed Pete's life.

Nearly all his gay friends had been disowned by their birth families. I came to wonder could be so callous to a child they brought into this world, a child whose very breath of life was a gift of our Creator.

Pete's death was a family tragedy. He was gifted as a pianist, organist, and painter. One of his watercolors hangs in my living room.

My son is a homosexual, and I am proud of him, his spouse, and their place in society. ill holds a PhD in physics bestowed by the University of Washington and is a registered professional engineer. While he was an undergraduate studying Aeronautical Engineering at The University of Michigan, he earned a private pilot's license. His husband Ernie holds a BS degree in microbiology from The University of Michigan and an MBA from the University of Washington. Pete's death was a family tragedy. He was gifted as a pianist, organist, and painter. One of his watercolors hangs in my living room.

They share a profound depth of love for each other that I admire, sometimes even envy. And, Will inherited my rotten sense of humor.

But I am most proud that these men extended their love to two adopted children. Each child was born to separate drug addled mothers. Their developmental, emotional, and psychological nature has been negatively affected by their birth mother's drug use. But Will and Ernie face their challenges with mountains of patience and understanding. They possess more parenting skills than I even knew existed. They continue obtaining professional help in meeting these children's challenges, tracking their progress, helping the boys overcome the life altering obstacles that were inflicted on them before their birth. They bask in unconditional love.

I see Jesus in Will and Ernie in the love they have for each other and their children. They have endeared themselves to many from both the heterosexual and gay communities. They have collected friends of great diversity, ethnicity, and cultural heritage.

Pete's sexuality, and later that of my son Will, sent me into a private search for my own religious values. I was raised in the conservative, dogmatic world of the Roman Catholic Church. I was conflicted between those beliefs and theology and my personal

Quickly I discovered that eking out guidance from scripture would be difficult. From our 21st century vantage point, it's hard to grasp scripture in the context of the language, mores, and cultures that existed centuries ago in the author's world. I turned to the writings of secular scholars who study scripture through lenses impartial to religious bias. Several repeated the same concerns regarding translating ancient tongues into contemporary language.

The writer's words we revere have been interpreted for us, perhaps through several iterations. We construe meaning further based on our own individual prejudices, what we have been taught, and on our personal life experiences. These authors have helped me reach my own comfortable, personal understanding.

During my search, in March, 2003, I read a small-town newspaper column written by Glenn Schicker. His weekly column was entitled "Make it Plain." Glenn started his study by wading into the controversy surrounding gay marriage. In the second installment published the following week, Glenn suggested guidance about the various scriptural references often applied to homosexuality.

May I share some excerpts of his words:*

'Test everything" the apostle Paul advised. "Hold on to the good" (1 Thessalonians 5:21)"

"Do not believe every spirit," the apostle John wrote, "but test the spirits to see whether they are from God..." (1 John 4:1) Don't take anyone else's word for it. Look to the Bible - not just isolated passages, but the context of the entire Scriptures.

Don't have a desired conclusion in mind; let the Bible speak for itself."

Further on in his column, he raised some thought-provoking questions:

"Are homosexuals among those Jesus came to save?

Should Christians welcome into the church homosexuals who place their faith in Christ?

Is homosexual behavior a sin?

If so, is it worse than other sins?

Should the church confront sin among the members?

Should the church attempt to enforce its moral standards on non-believers?

What is marriage?

In dealing with the world, should Christians look out for their own interests?"

He concluded:

May we look to the example of Jesus and the truth of the Bible, not to how we think things ought to be, as we decide our own course of action"

Returning to scripture, it occurred to me again that we are all individual creatures of God, constructed and tempered as God intended, fashioned in the image of God, each receiving certain gifts, denied others. I found clarity in Genesis: "God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good." (Gen. 1:31)

It is painful to hear otherwise good people express prejudices, disgust, disapproval or other critical statements in mean, vindictive ways. Some seem to have designated themselves God's judge, handing down a sentence of eternal damnation on people who find themselves in a non-traditional relationship. My dad's words came to mind: "Mind your own business and you'll have a full-time job." I don't believe I am empowered to be judgmental. God has not made me His magistrate.

It is sad that this controversy provokes some self-identified "Christians" to make statements so hateful and un-Christ like. There are occasions I wish I did not seek God through this avenue. Nowhere in the Gospels did Christ condemn anyone. Am I to ignore his teaching, his very culture of gentle love? I don't think so.

My ongoing journey has been influenced by The Rev. Peter J. Gomes, author of *The Good Book - Reading the bible with mind and heart*. Rev. Gomes, American Baptist Clergy, was Chaplain to Harvard University when he wrote *The Good Book*. I have gained further understanding from The Rev. Adam Hamilton's *Making Sense of the Bible, Rediscovering the Power of Scripture Today* and *Seeing Gray in a World of Black and White*. Other resources include the writings of author Bart D. Ehrman¹ (Chairman, Department of Religious Studies at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill) and newspaper columnist Glen E. Schicker.
