MESSAGE FROM PASTOR JOE



Dear Church Family,

Greetings, fellow eaglets! As I was having my morning oatmeal, I witnessed quite a show, a livestream of an eagle feeding its baby. Try as I might, I couldn't get a sharp picture of the eaglet. The tiny bird was just too excited about his breakfast to sit still. He was far more excited than I was about my oatmeal!

This text, Isaiah 40:28-31, was read at the service for Jean Bennett and Maryada Millspaugh, both matriarchs of our church. I have read this text at many memorial services. Whenever I read it, I often picture Jean, Maryada, and others who have passed on, soaring as majestic eagles, looking magnificent against a deep blue sky.

This little guy reminded me that eagles first must begin as eaglets, helpless without their mother and father, who bring nourishment for them, who keep them warm, and who teach them how to fend for themselves.

Jean, Maryada, and others who have passed before us had a lifetime of learning from their Divine Parent, as taught to them by their parents, teachers, and others who loved and cared for them.

It was a joy for me personally to witness Jean's desire to keep learning, even into her 90s. Last summer, through the help of her son-in-law, Jean took part in one of my bible studies, held online via Zoom. She wanted to be a part of this study. She knew she wasn't finished growing yet.

Her witness was a reminder to me that we should never stop learning. We never reach a point where we "know it all." Our Parent Eagle has much yet to teach us, and we have much to learn. Going forward, may we never forget that.



We will offer pancakes, sausage and a "toppings bar" for you to pick from a variety of yummy surprises! Walk-ins will be welcome, but in order to give us an idea of numbers to help with our planning, please sign up at the Welcome Center in the narthex or indicate on the back of our attendance sheets beginning in Feb. We hope to see you there!

FYI - Shrove Tuesday (also known in some countries as Pancake Tuesday) is the day immediately preceding Ash Wednesday (the first day of Lent), which is celebrated in some countries by consuming pancakes. In others,

especially those where it is called Mardi Gras or some translation thereof, this is a carnival day, and also the last day of "fat eating" or "gorging" before the fasting period of Lent. The expression "Shrove Tuesday" comes from the word shrive, meaning "absolve".

Pancakes are associated with the day because they were a way to use up rich foods such as eggs, milk, and sugar, before the fasting season of the 40 days of Lent. The liturgical fasting emphasized eating plainer food and refraining from food that would give pleasure; in many cultures, this means no meat, dairy products or eggs. "Donations will be accepted" to be used for our summer VBS!

FINANCIAL UPDATE

Greetings St. Mark's Family,

The administrative board approved the church's 2022 budget. The budget is intended to be a guide or plan for the year. Based on the strong response to pledge cards, we budgeted total giving of \$340,000 for the year. This is an 8% increase from the 2021 giving. We also budget \$340,000 in expenses for the year – so we have a balanced budget. In other words, we will spend what we bring in to run the church and perform our ministries. The biggest categories for our expenses are as follows:

Category	Total Budget	Change from 2021	Description
Our staff	\$187,400	10% increase	Salaries and benefits for our staff
Facilities	\$58,800	8% decrease	Costs for utilities, property taxes, cutting the grass, removing snow, repairs and maintenance (includes the parsonage costs as well)
Administration	\$40,600	15% increase	Costs for running the office, like the copier, office supplies, banking costs, insurance and computer expenses
Apportionments	\$31,600	15% decrease	The district and conference continue to cut their budgets which saves us money
Worship & Ministries	\$15,700	255% increase	Increases are due to low spending in 2021 due to the pandemic and bigger plans for 2022!
Loan payments	\$6,300	61% decrease	We paid off the line of credit last year

We received \$25,000 in December – about \$1,000 more than in November. For the entire year, we received \$314,500 which was down about 3% from the prior year. We spent nearly \$27,600 during the month. For the year, we spent \$312,000 – just \$2,500 more the prior year. The church staff and leaders did a great job in handling our expenses keeping them in check.

There were many positives in 2021 from a financial standpoint. We ended the year with nearly \$60,000 in credit union. We reduced our total debt by about \$14,000 and paid 100% of our apportionments again! We still have \$20,000 left in the parking lot fund. We also spent only about \$2,500 more to "run" the church despite the building being "open" for most of the year compared to the prior year.



ROOM AT THE TABLE UPDATE



I am writing this on behalf of the Room at the Table committee, a group of dedicated St. Mark's folks who are advocating for St. Mark's to become a Reconciling Ministries church.

What is a Reconciling ministries church? In case you don't know or need your memory refreshed...currently the United Methodist Church Book of Discipline states that "homosexuality is incompatible with Christ's teaching." Becoming a reconciling church would be making the public statement that we <u>DO NOT agree</u> with that statement. We would affirm that <u>all</u> are children of God, beloved, and celebrated as their authentic selves. We <u>DO NOT believe that homosexuality is a sin.</u> We DO NOT think anyone who is lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, questioning, intersex, or asexual is a sinner. Further, we believe that there should be full inclusion of LGBTQ+ persons in the life and ministry of the United Methodist Church, both in policy and practice, to include <u>both</u>

ordination and same-sex marriage. If our church would vote to become a Reconciling ministry church, we would also adopt this welcoming statement for St. Mark's.

We celebrate God's gift of diversity and value the wholeness made possible in community equally shared and shepherded by all. We welcome and affirm people of every gender identity, gender expression, and sexual orientation, who are also of every age, race, ethnicity, physical and mental ability, level of education, and family structure, and of every economic, immigration, marital, and social status, and so much more. We acknowledge that we live in a world of profound social, economic, and political inequities. As followers of Jesus, we commit ourselves to the pursuit of justice and pledge to stand in solidarity with all who are marginalized and oppressed.

As a reminder, our group began meeting in 2019, hit a little snag in 2020 like the rest of the world, but began working earnestly in 2021. We were recognized by the Admin Board in May of 2021 as an official committee of St. Mark's, which basically means we were given permission to officially explore this idea for St. Marks. And that is what we have been doing! Our group has been working its way through the steps in "Building an Inclusive Church," an amazing welcoming toolkit that has been used for many years by various denominations to help lead their congregation or group through this journey. We've followed the steps in the toolkit thus far by using their overall guiding principle, graceful engagement and honest conversation.

We've had one-on-one visits and held open educational events all with the hope of building relationships and leading our church toward this common goal of becoming an all affirming church, welcoming and celebrating persons of any sexual identity, gender expression or sexual orientation. Our group met with the Rev. Dr. Suzanne Allen, our district assistant superintendent, who provided valuable leadership guidance for this journey.

Pastor Joe has led 5 sessions of the "Faithful and Inclusive" study that looks to the bible for guidance in this journey. Almost 50 people have participated in that class. Our group led 2 sessions where we watched and discussed the documentary "Through Our Eyes," which follows several young adults' journey of coming out to their church, which is often very painful and harmful in the current context. We led sessions watching and discussing "An Act of Love," the story of a UMC pastor who performed the same-sex marriage for his son, and the subsequent charges that were brought upon him by the church and the trials that followed. We've led events viewing and discussing "How a Community of Faith can Respond to its LGBTQ Members," where loving, helpful advice was shared, particularly about how we can respond to and support our youth and young adult LGBTQ friends. If anyone was not able to attend any of these sessions, we have the DVDs available and would be happy to lend them to you.

Continuing to follow the steps of the journey, our goal is to conduct an "exploratory survey" as early as May of 2022, where we will do an informal straw poll of the congregation. This will help to assess where we are, what information or education is still needed or wanted, and to help us discern if we should continue our efforts toward an official congregational vote, or to cease our efforts. If we move to an official vote, it will occur very soon after this exploratory survey.

In the meantime, we will continue to offer informational events and provide space for honest, graceful conversation. We've had good response to these events, but it is important to us to hear from all of our congregation. We want to be able to respond to all joys and concerns around the reconciling process. We understand that this may be something that is uncomfortable for you to talk about. We understand that you may have strong feelings one way or the other. We understand that you may be conflicted and not sure how you feel. To that end, we are providing the opportunity for you to share those joys and concerns anonymously.

There are only 2 simple questions we are asking.

If our congregation voted to become a reconciling church,

1)What would excite you the most? and

2)What would concern you the most?

We would like your responses back by February 6th. This gives you the chance to share your thoughts and it gives our group much needed insight about what informational events and discussions we should plan for the future. YOU DO NOT HAVE TO PUT YOUR NAME ON THE CARD. There are cards with these two questions, and they are available in the church office, or you can simply answer the 2 questions on a sheet of paper. You can put the cards or paper in the stewardship box in the narthex, mail them to church, turn them into the office in person, or put them in the mailbox of anyone in our group.

This would be a good time to remind everyone who our group members are. Every one of them is willing and available to talk to you. Please seek them out if you have questions, concerns or even ideas.

PUBLIC STORYTELLING—SUE LUKEN STORY

Growing up as a "Preacher's Kid" came with certain expectations! How to behave, how to present yourself, and even what you're taught to believe. And as a young person I never really realized it or questioned that. It was simply a part of my life and who I was. "I didn't Know any better!" Truthfully there were subjects that we really didn't discuss at home. One of those being human sexuality. I was both pretty naive and uninformed about that subject probably until around the time I began high school in 1976 when I started to get curious and learned more about it from my peers than my parents! That's when I started to first realize that some of my classmates may have been a little different than myself as far as who they were "crushing on". It began to dawn on me when I heard rumors fly that Todd who was not only very cute and tall but had an amazing singing voice and always landed the lead role in all of the theater productions, and who I saw as a potential boyfriend, might be gay. He never actually came out in H.S. and at the time I never really questioned why that might be. That he may have feared what the reaction would be, what people might say, or worse DO to him! My own reaction to the rumor itself was "darn, what a waste.... he likes guys!" Again, "I didn't know any better!"

As I entered my college years, I attended a small college in Zanesville, Ohio Muskingum Area Technical College that actually shared the campus with a branch of Ohio University. When my 6'2" self stepped foot onto the campus, I was immediately swooped upon and asked if I played basketball. I replied that I had only played for fun never on an organized team other than intramurals. Well, they didn't care. They begged me to "try out" for the women's basketball team telling me that they would work with me and coach me along! I think they really just wanted to have a 6'2" player listed on the team roster, you know... an intimidation factor! Well, it wouldn't be long however before the other teams realized that I was a different kind of player and didn't pose much of a threat regardless of my height. Soon it was evident to me that some of my teammates were different than myself in other ways as well. And I began to hear talk about all the "lesbians", (well maybe not in that exact wording) on the women's basketball team. I didn't know quite how to deal with that. All I knew is that I didn't want to be labeled and lumped into that category. It made me.... uncomfortable, and I wondered what had I gotten myself into! I for sure knew that I didn't want my team mates to "hit on me" or try to do anything to "persuade" me to be like them. So, the way I handled it was to make sure I came across "extra girly"! I always made sure my nails were painted, and I wore full make up everywhere I went, even to practices. I didn't care if I sweat it off. My hair was always curled or put up into a ponytail or bun with a cute ribbon. And when we were told we had to dress up for away games, yep, I put on dresses and heels. I had assumed that all lesbians dressed and presented themselves in a more masculine way. After all, "I didn't know any better!" Well, after a short while it finally dawned on me that I should not assume but begin to educate myself and begin to "know better"! I mean these were some really fabulous, funny, and talented young women from a variety of backgrounds, and they were my friends! They had never once "hit on me" or tried to change me. They knew I liked and dated guys and they totally accepted me for who I was and would affectionately yell out "Its 6-2 Sue" whenever they saw me around campus! I became very comfortable around them and got to know them even better and listened to their stories and accepted them for who they were! This was the first time I really heard that who they were, their sexual orientation, was not a choice but that who they were was how they were born! Now none of them ever mentioned God or declared that it was God who created them this way, and it made me sad to hear that some of them had been told by "the church and people in it" that they were not of God, again remembering that it was the early 1980's now. I just wanted them to know that none of that mattered to me, and that I accepted them and yes, I can even say I loved some of these women as great friends, and that I was sorry that they had been treated so poorly by people who claimed to be Christians! I maybe didn't still fully understand all of it, as I myself couldn't imagine being attracted to another female, it was just unnatural to me. But for the first time I really opened my mind to begin to listen and understand that it was natural for them! And I knew I had to continue to learn to "know better"!

As I continued my journey into adulthood and graduated, I moved to Cincinnati to job hunt. I found a church that I began to attend. It was a pretty conservative church I guess you would say. I began to get involved with a singles group, and then began to volunteer with the youth group on occasion. One Sunday evening a guest speaker came to talk with our youth. It was a young adult man late 20's early 30's probably and he spoke about how he had "come out" to his parents, again, in the 1970's, and they had sent him to "Conversion Therapy" to help him overcome being gay. Honestly, I don't remember all of the details, but he claimed that therapy taught him to just ignore or put aside and not act on his desires and to adjust his behavior to live out a normal heterosexual relationship in order to be right with God. Something within me just felt very uncomfortable with this as he was telling us all of this and how he was now married to a wonderful woman and building a family with her. I felt a certain uneasiness about him. It felt like he wasn't being truthful or genuinely authentic, but rather that it was like he was playing a role that he had been told to portrait. It is really hard to explain the discomfort I felt. This again made me feel very uninformed and naive because I had never heard of this Conversion Therapy previously. It also concerned me that he was speaking these words to our young people when quite possibly this was something one of them could be trying to figure out for themselves! I also felt great sadness that this young man had not been accepted and seemed to not really accept his authentic self but was told or even forced to change to what others thought was normal or acceptable! Once again, it was another sign that made me want to learn more to 'know better", that NOT knowing better could no longer be an excuse for my ignorance about this subject.

I myself do not have a family member who is part of the LGBTQ+ community, but over the years have had many acquaintances and friends who are. Including in my church family here at St. Mark's. In fact, several years ago there was one person in particular that I began to have some authentic communication with and started to ask them questions and have meaningful open conversations with to try and overcome my ignorance or misinformation on the subject of being transgender, to better understand and embrace who they were as the person they truly believe God created them to be! In the years since, I have tried to learn and grow and to connect with opportunities such as in-depth seminars and various speakers that our West Ohio Conference has sponsored, as well as reading several books by Christian authors. My own ignorance or lack of theological knowledge has been slowly evolving over the last 20 years, but especially growing over the last 5-10 years. I have been evolving in this with the help of both our last Pastor, and currently with Pastor Joe and working and exploring together, side by side with some amazing church family members and leaders right here at St. Mark's! I am still continuing to "Know Better" and "Do Better" to hopefully show everyone that I may connect with that I fully accept them for who they are and to help them to believe that they are a beloved child of God, created by HIM, just as they are to BE and to DO great things in HIS Kingdom! To show them that they too deserve to live a full and authentic life of love and to be fully included, valued, accepted and celebrated for who they are, just as you or I long for that in our lives. It is my hope and dream that we here as the faith family of St, Mark's can come fully alongside of each other on this continuing journey to fully love and care for all of God's people!
