These statements will be helpful as we continue to dialogue on this vitally important life and justice matter, which affect us individually and as a church family.

PAM BROCKFIELD'S STORY

People come to God in many ways. Some have always believed, were raised in the church and strengthened their belief as they grew. Some had a mountaintop experience and were Born Again. Some studied, questioned, listened and learned and came to a logical conclusion that God is real and had a prominent place in their lives. I think that is true also for coming to understanding and acceptance of the LGBTQ+ community.

I fall in the middle of both. I was raised in the church by loving accepting parents. I questioned many things about faith and grew as I did. I am a child of the 50's and 60's. I grew up in a suburban white community. I had no contact, which I knew of, with LGBTQ+ people. We had a single man as a neighbor who never married and cared for his invalid mother until she died. He was a good friend of my parents, we shared dinners back and forth. He played the piano at my wedding. Now I realize from conversations with my older sister that he was gay. My parents were probably aware of this, but it was never mentioned, nor ever a concern.

When I went to college, I'm sure there were gay people but no one mentioned it. People were not coming out of the closet in the later 60's with the people I knew. My sister was dating and later married a man who had a cousin who was gay. He lived in Chicago with his partner. They visited Cincinnati one time and came to my parents' home. It was no big deal, they were who they were. After I graduated from college, I knew a gay man who was getting a lot of pressure from the people he worked with. They questioned him about having a girlfriend. He felt that his job was on the line. Their Christmas party was coming up and he needed to produce a girlfriend. He asked if I would pose as his girlfriend for the evening. I went with him and we put on a convincing show. I think now, how sad that that was necessary. At that time, I did not think right or wrong, good or bad, LGBTQ+ people were just people.

In the later 90's and first part of this century, I was frequently the Lay Member to Annual Conference. That is when I was first aware of the restrictions in the Discipline. I listened to the debates, heard the Bible verses, and became confused. If the Bible says that it is an abomination to lie with a man as with a woman, then isn't it wrong? But when I read the Old Testament accounts, it sounded like rape and a use of power. That didn't sound like a loving relationship between two people. I remember one Annual Conference where we heard from speakers saying that gays could be cured, that it was wrong, that it was a life style. More confusion. But this just didn't seem right. Why would someone choose a life style that would guarantee ostracism? But it didn't touch me personally. No one that I know of in my family is gay. I worked in Social Work in the late 70's and the agency I worked with was concerned about volunteers who might be gay working with our clients. You would hear the rhetoric that gay men were child molesters. Statistics show this to be false.

When my children were small and I was a teacher, I would have discussions with other teachers on whether or not we would want a gay person to teach our children. I am sad to say that I bought into the mindset for a time. I didn't want someone to teach my small children that it was an acceptable lifestyle. Lifestyle?? Being LGBTQ+ is not a lifestyle. It is who a person is. Looking back I can name a number of teachers and students who are or I suspect are gay. I retired from teaching in 2007, it was still not, for the most part, something that we openly talked about.

Through church, I have been involved in a number of Adam Hamilton's book studies. One thing Adam Hamilton said in one of his books made so much sense. At first he told gay people who came to his church that they were welcome to come and be members, they just needed to remain celibate. Then he thought, "How can I deny them the same loving relationship that I have with my wife?" It was so logical and sensible. It was so loving and accepting.

Recently I heard of the divorce of the son of friends of ours. The couple had been married for a number of years and have 2 children. A mutual friend said that the wife "preferred women." My first thought was how sad for the wife that she had to live all these years and could not be who she truly was.

I don't agree with the Discipline that says no LGBTQ+ person may be ordained nor marry someone of the same sex. No clergy (whether gay or not) may perform same sex weddings. This is making people second class citizens. We attended a panel discussion at our former church after the 2019 General Conference. The 3 speakers were extremely conservative. I asked a question or two and made a comment or two. After the meeting, one of the speakers came up to me and asked me who I knew that was gay, because she felt that was the only way I would feel as I do. We changed churches because the clergy and leadership at our former church were pushing for separation from the United Methodist Church. The more LGBTQ+ people I meet, the more I feel that all loving people have a place in the United Methodist Church.

I have in my 30 years at St. Mark's had the privilege and honor to be "up front" for many weddings and funerals. I am not able to sing when I see people crying or who are emotional. Weddings and funerals are not easy to do, but the many ranges of feelings on faces is always special to behold.

Greetings St. Mark's Family,

Our new year is off to a good start.

We received \$35,200 in January – about \$10,000 more than in December and almost the same as in January 2021. Our January giving is normally strong as a few members make their contribution for the entire year.

We spent about \$28,700 during the month which was about \$1,300 more than the prior month. January typically has higher expenses as we have some bills we have to pay for the entire year.

We ended the month with about \$64,000 at the credit union. Of this, approximately \$20,000 is in the parking lot fund as we work to wrap up that project and \$40,000 is in designated funds. We also ended the month with about \$5,000 in bills due. The solid giving allowed us to reduce our borrowed funds by about \$6,000 as we are only now borrowing about \$1,500 from our designated accounts.

National Pi Day


